Every year the Taylor Family Foundation Schools' Matinees programme gives schools the opportunity to take their pupils to special matinee performances of six of the season's Royal Opera House productions.

This is an incredible opportunity to introduce young people to the world-class ballet and opera produced by the Royal Opera House. The Schools' Matinees are hugely popular and reach over 12,000 school children from across the UK each year.

We were lucky enough to get tickets to see La Boheme. Giacomo Puccini's romantic depiction of bohemian Paris, with memorable music and a love story drawn from everyday life, which has captivated audiences round the world, making *La bohème* one of the best-loved of all operas. It was first performed in Covent Garden in 1897 and has had over 500 performances there since.

As well as watching the wonderful opera, the children met Richard, one of the French Horn players, in the interval, who talked about playing in an orchestra.

World Book Day

World Book day is on Thursday 7th March. **BUT** because that's our Parents Evening, William Patten is celebrating World Book Day on Wednesday 6th March. Who will we see this year?!

BLINK filming in Reception

Aisha Kola (our apprentice working in Reception Bethany) had a great time taking part in a psychological experiment with the BLINK team and Reception B. An activity was carried out to see whether the children would tell the truth when faced with a certain situation! The activity involved a child being seated in the centre of the room with a hidden surprise behind them and they were told to face forward at all times and to not look back. The surprise was then revealed and then Aisha left the room saying she had forgotten something in the room next door. The children were told not to look round at the surprise while Aisha was out the room. Aisha then joined the BLINK team in the room next door and watched the child on the screen, who was being filmed by 4 hidden cameras.

After a few minutes Aisha went back into the room and asked the child whether they had looked. Many of the children had looked, but replied no! Only one child admitted looking (but with an extremely cheeky grin!!!)

A different activity was carried out on 5 children - they were asked to decorate a chocolate cake with Smarties, but were told that they weren't allowed to eat any of them. Aisha once again left the room and the children helped themselves to the sweets! When Aisha entered the room, she asked them if they'd eaten any, again they replied no!

The experiments have been carried out nationally (and internationally) and the William Patten results yielded the same results. The BLINK team where extremely impressed with the children's behaviour throughout filming and are putting a documentary together to be shown on TV in March so look out for it.

Year 4 visit the V and A

Both Year 4 classes went to the V and A museum on Friday 11th January, to support their work they are doing in class on patterns. The children travelled on the tube to get there, before listening really well to the workshop talks.

Year 5 visit a Peter Clarke exhibition

Year 5 had the wonderful opportunity to visit the Institute of International Visual Arts (Iniva) in Shoreditch, to begin a three-week project about printmaking. They looked at the work of South African artist and poet Peter Clarke, focusing on his graphic prints made from woodcuts. With the gallery closed to the public on Mondays, the Education Curator, Teresa gave both classes a private tour of the Wind Blowing on the Cape Flats exhibition where the children, equipped with pads, paper and pencils took notes and sketches of their favoured works of art. The children then returned to the workshop to continue sketching their own ideas based on their interests and daily life, all inspired by Clarke's unique style.

The children are now looking forward to the next few weeks where their artist-instructor, Ursula will visit them to continue their work creating limited edition prints based on their designs. Using the Linocut technique of printmaking, the children will carve their designs into small sheets of lino, ink them using a brayer and then impress them onto paper...expect a display of their efforts in school in the not too distant future!

Year 6 "2moro project"

Peer facilitators from the "2moro" project visited Year 6 on Tuesday 15th January. The children played a variety of team games based on cooperation, working as a team and being able to follow instructions. The children participated very well and the visitors were very impressed with the children's behaviour.

Year 1 visit the Tate Modern

Both Year 1 classes went to the Tate Modern on Wednesday. They travelled on the bus and saw St. Pauls before crossing the Millennium bridge to reach the Tate. The children toured the gallery looking at sculptures and deciding what each sculpture was made from. The children discovered that sculptures can be made from many different materials including wood, metal, clay, paper and even Christmas trees!

Back in school the children talked about their favourite sculptures – they then wrote about them and some were nominated in Good Deeds assembly for their super writing about the sculptures.

NFER pre tests

All Year 6 pupils will have to take a new Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar test this year, as part of the KS2 SATs.

The NFER (National Foundation for Educational Research) has been commissioned by the DfE, to trial the new materials for the assessment of high attaining pupils working at level 6 at the end of Keystage 2.

As a high achieving school, William Patten has been selected to take part in the trial.

A representative from the NFER will come to school in April to administer two grammar, punctuation and spelling tests to a group of Year 6 children. This means we have the opportunity to experience the new type of test for the first time before anyone else!
