




Language Leaders

This month we are speaking Azeri (Azerbaijani)

- Thank you çox sağ ol ('choch sa houl' using the throat to make the 'ch' sound, similar to the Spanish 'j')
- Please xahiş edirəm (Haarshaderim)
- Yes bəli (bell-eh)
- **No** Yox (Pronounced 'Yoch' using the throat to make the 'ch' sound, similar to the Spanish 'j')
