## Black History Month and beyond at William Patten

William Patten kicked off Black History Month this week with some assemblies. KS1 and Year 3 learned about the history of Ridley Road Market and why it became such an important place for African and African-Caribbean people to meet. The trips to Ridley Road start this week. In the next few weeks, Years 4 – 6 will be going to Hackney Museum to participate in a workshop exploring how African heritage individuals have shaped Hackney to be the borough it is today. During assembly, Caitlin took the children on a virtual tour of London to look at memorials relating to Black people and their experiences. Here are some of the stops on the tour. I wonder how many they can remember...














You can see some more memorials to Black History in Hackney this month. A number of artists were asked to represent their view of Black History as art and there are a trail of these globes in Hackney. You can follow the trail <a href="here">here</a>. Finally, a new permanent public sculpture by celebrated artist Veronica Ryan been unveiled in east London. The series of three works – large marble and bronze sculptures, representing Caribbean fruit and vegetables – is situated near Mare Street. The work references stories of migration and movement and draws on the artist's memories of visiting east London markets, including Hackney's Ridley Road Market, as a child.



If you are out and about in Hackney, we would love to see photos of you beside any of these art works! Classes will continue to celebrate achievements by Black individuals this month by focusing on an individual that that relates to their topic work. Look out for displays around the school celebrating those individuals in the next month.

#### Year 3 trip for BHM

We talked to the people working there, made sketches and learnt about various statues and artwork. Everyone involved had a fantastic time and showed superb curiosity. Mary Wollstonecraft Assembly



You may recall that in the summer term, children in Year 5 and 6 completed a mini project on Mary Wollstonecraft. As well as learning about Mary Wollstonecraft, they devised and led assemblies with the other classes from Years 1 – 4. This project was supported by the Mary Wollstonecraft Society and met the criteria for the Wollstonecraft Society School Award. Bee Rowlatt from the Society, visited the KS2 assembly last week and presented the award to the school, in recognition of the quality of this work. Children recalled what they had learnt during the project and Bee told them more about this local significant historical figure, and her legacy today. The school is looking forward to further coordinated work with the Mary Wollstonecraft Society and we are very grateful to Bee for validating this work and for the resources available which enabled this high quality project, which enriched and complemented the school's history curriculum which recognises the significance of Mary Wollstonecraft.




#### **WP Wellbeing Champions**

The Wellbeing Champions have already met several times this term to discuss the wellbeing of pupils at WP, and how they can help raise the profile and importance of good mental health. They are a brilliant team with lots of enthusiasm and ideas!



Their first job of the year was to set up the 'Regulation Station' boxes and deliver them to each classroom from Nursery to year 6. This supports our whole-school approach to 'Zones of Regulation' – providing a quiet space in the learning environment to practise self-regulation strategies with a range of tools.



Next, they met with our WAMHs linked professionals: Lora (CAMHs) and Cansu (MHST) were mightily impressed with their skills, ideas, positive outlook and empathy for the children at William Patten. They asked and we have ordered two benches that will be decorated to become a 'Friend Bench' in each of the playgrounds. This will be a place for children to gather and make new friends as well as meet the Wellbeing Champions. What a great idea! I wonder how the team will decorate ours.




