		 Preparation time was provided to the subject leader at the beginning of the year, to plan a collaborative inset with the SENDCo. This formed a significant part of the school's initial INSET programme for staff and ensured that children engaged in a wider range of focussed physical activities, during play times and lunch times within the school day. New activities themselves were modelled to and with all staff, and those specific to ball skills in KS1 were used as a curriculum resource.
