

As predicted, the feral pigeon was the most common, along with some black headed gulls and a swarm of crows too! Karen set them the task of finding out if the swan who lives there had found a friend, sadly it was still swimming solo, but we have high hopes and fingers and toes crossed for next year! The children also spotted some more tropical feathery friends, in the form of bright green parakeets, which caused squeals of excitement. Shakespeare workshops

This week is Shakespeare Week in the UK, and we have been celebrating with some fantastic workshops run by West End in Schools - a theatre in education company. Adam, the workshop leader, has been engaging children from Reception through to Year 6 with activities linked to The Tempest and A Midsummer Night's Dream. The sound of excited thespians has radiated from the bottom hall, where children have developed many theatrical skills. Some highlights include learning to walk in the style of different characters, leading with different body parts to create different effects, and how to clearly deliver lines in Shakespearean English. Engaging their bodies and brains, children participated in a range of activities. Isaac (6M) said his favourite was the 'Bus-stop game', where two children took on the role of characters from the play but had to act as if meeting at a bus stop. The rest of the class then had to identify the characters based solely on the brief performance. An absolutely BRILLIANT time was had by all, and we would like to again extend our thanks to Adam for making the magic of Shakespeare truly come alive for our children this week. 








Place2Be 'Parenting Smart' course

It is split into six modules, each focusing on one parenting skill that will help improve the parent — child relationship and identify new ways to respond to challenging behaviour:

Connecting: How to build a strong bond with your child

Praise & Reward: How to encourage desired

behaviours

Selective Ignoring: How to discourage unwanted behaviours

Clear Instructions: How to ensure your child understands what is expected of them

Boundaries and Consequences: How to set limits in advance in an effective way

Time Out: How to manage extreme behaviours A family practitioner will be the moderator of the course. The family practitioner will support the parents and carers and answer any questions they might have.

Sowing and Growing Underway!

Eco Team members from Years 4, 5 and 6 joined Laura and Craig one lunchtime recently, to sow seeds for their classes. They first filled plant pots with seed compost and then sowed their seeds according to each pack's instructions. The seeds will initially be looked after and watered in class, before the seedlings are transferred to their allocated growing areas.

- Year 6 sowed pepper seeds, which we are optimistic will grow on the roof terrace owing to the amount of sun it receives
- Year 5 sowed tomato seeds, which are also well suited to the rooftop beds.
- Year 4 sowed cucumber seeds.

The seeds were watered and taken to each classroom as part of the process. Year 3 are set to sow lettuce seeds in their raised beds, before the Easter break, and will also be planting leeks in the edible playground. Year 2 planted anemone and lupin bulbs earlier this week (which links to their science topic) and Year 1 will soon be sowing pumpkin seeds. EYFS are also planning to sow a dwarf variety of sunflower seeds on the roof before the break, and tomato seeds in their classes for their outdoor areas.
