


Budding aviators!

Olga demonstrated how we could row a Viking longship effectively, helped us build our own longhouse, explained what we could expect at a Viking meal and recounted an epic Viking saga about Thor. She also read our fortunes using runes and explained how Vikings sought justice at a court or Thing! What a great way to start our Viking history topic!





EYFS 'Animal Day'

Just before the Easter holidays, on our first EYFS Animal Day, children dressed up as their favourite animal as a final celebration of our 'Animals' investigation during the spring half-term. During this topic children learnt about diverse environments and ecosystems, and the animals found in these different habitats. We discussed sustainability and our impact on the environment. We had so many animals in class on Animal Day; a parrot, several sloths, many rabbits, two lions, a bat, a pig, one poisonous dart frog, a rooster, lots of foxes, a collection of tigers, three unicorns and a clutch of bears to name but a few. We thoroughly enjoyed this special day.



















Year 5 attended a performance by the LSO

Before the Easter break, a group of musicians from Year 5 were given the opportunity to visit the home of the London Symphony Orchestra: The Barbican. On a wet, grey Tuesday we made our through London to see a full-scale orchestra tackle marvellous pieces of music from the American Songbook. Throughout the performance, we listened and danced in our seats to George Gershwin, Charlie Chaplin and many more fine composers. The students were also delighted to spot two musicians that recently collaborated with WP during our recent workshop. Exiting the auditorium one Year 5 student bellowed, "I feel so inspired!". 






Maths Hub Participants visit William Patten

Participants from schools across the London North East Maths Hub region, visited William Patten in the final week of the spring term. The participants took part in training and observed a year 6 maths lesson, within the unit of work on fractions, decimals and percentages. The children investigated the relationship between fractions and decimals, making conversions between the two. The work included the concept of numbers with recurring digits and the children deepened their understanding through mathematical reasoning and problem solving.



Once again, the participants were very complimentary about the excellent engagement of the children during their lesson and were impressed with what they were able to achieve. We had lots of positive feedback, which included the following from other Hackney schools:

'Thank you so much for today's session. It was so valuable and I took so much away for my own practice and to share with our team. Your children are a real credit to your wonderful school. It was such a joy to see them think so deeply and make connections".

'(There were) so many useful tips and thought processes for breaking down mastery teaching."

William Patten is a specialist mastery school within the National Maths Hubs programme. As such, we also continue to benefit from close relations and training with the National centre for Excellence in the Teaching of Mathematics (NCETM).

Planting and sowing!

Nursery have been enjoying planting seeds. We have planted sunflower seeds on the roof garden and we have planted tomatoes as well as planting courgettes, peppers and cucumbers in our indoor planter in our classroom.

Lettuce Seeds Sown

Members of the Y3 Eco Team and Nevaeh sowed lettuce seeds on the roof terrace a few weeks ago. All went to plan and the lettuce plants had started to grow by the time we returned from the Easter break. We will now be able to add our home-grown leaves to tasty salads throughout the summer term.





Y5 Eco Team in action

The Year 5 Eco Team were busy just before Easter, planting bulb and sowing seeds to germinate over the break. First, the team dug holes in the surrounding beds on the roof, before planting gladioli bulbs. They then scattered nigella seeds which they covered with a thin layer of compost. Next the children snipped and dug in some of the green manure in the edible playground and planted beans and edible flower seeds. The children also transferred kale from the rooftop to the playground beds, where we hope it will be happier! The children did a terrific job, finding many enormous wriggly worms in the process, which was much to everyone's entertainment!



Year 2 Science lesson

Our topic in Science is **'Living things and their habitats'**, Year 2 have been learning about applying the 7 life processes to establish whether something is 'alive', 'not living' or 'has never been alive'. We had a great outdoor lesson on our roof garden to see what we could find.









Letters from Madrid

This week, we received letters from our partner school in Madrid. These have now been given to every class from Y1-Y6. Over the next few weeks, we will be preparing our replies in Spanish as part of our MFL curriculum. We are also looking forward to arranging video calls for each class, between the schools very soon!



Solving maths problems

This week in our daily maths sessions in Nursery, we have been looking at Numicon and working out the value of each Numicon piece. Today, we did some addition using the Numicon to solve maths problems using numbers to 10 and numbers to 20. We talked about the value of the Numicon pieces, we then added two or more groups together and wrote how many we had in total. Fantastic work Nursery!













Yoto Carnegie Shadowing Scheme 2023

As the summer term begins, our Year 6 Reading Leaders are fortunate enough to have the opportunity to take part in the Yoto Carnegie shadowing scheme!

What is the Yoto Carnegie?

The Yoto Carnegie Awards are the UK's longest running and best loved awards for children and young people. The awards celebrate outstanding achievement in children's writing and illustration and are unique in that they are judged by children's librarians, with the Shadowers' Choice award being voted for by children and young people - including our Reading Leaders! 
