Over the next few weeks we have three important events coming up that are central to our fundraising activities for the year.

Calendar for the Summer Term:

To make the three events a success we really need your help. A few specific areas we need support are below, but any help you can provide would be greatly received:

- > Volunteers for the 5km race on Saturday 20th May at the end of Active Living Week - We need help to marshall the race and manage the post race picnic

- > Volunteers to support the Summer Fair on 1st July

Active Living Week:

Active living week is about raising awareness of the importance of living an active and healthy lifestyle, bringing the community together and having fun!

During the week the plan is to cover 2,500km as a school community. That's London to Paris and back three times! The distance will be split across two activities as below:

- 1. Collectively we're aiming for WP pupils to cover
- 1,250km! There is no minimum or maximum distance any one pupil can cover, it's a team effort. There are no rules on how pupils can cover the distance, it can be walking, cycling, running, scooting, etc. the only requirement is that the distance is captured and fed into the PTFA [we'll be setting up a shared form to capture individual contributions alongside a running total next week]. We'll also share the official course for the William Patten 5km Race at Clissold Park so that if pupils want to use that as the distance they cover they can do so
- 2. Guinness World Record attempt 5km run / walk at Clissold Park on Saturday 20th May. The aim is to have 250 parents, carers, family members and friends of William Patten take part in the run / walk collectively covering 1,250km

Please register for the race on Saturday 20th May as soon as possible using the link here. We need everyone to get involved if we're going to break the world record so please register, and spread the word!








STEM Week Poster Competition

Following on from last term's WW2 project, Year 3 got stuck into some D.T work where we designed and created our own Anderson shelters.












Carnegie Award shadowing

This week the Y6 Reading Leaders had their first independent meeting with the Carnegie Medal Shadowing team from Hackney. It was impressive to see them manage their time like pros, ensuring they were prepared to speak and joining the zoom meeting in their lunch break. The Shadowing group focused on the illustrations in two books - Saving Sorya and The Comet. They spoke eloquently and thoughtfully about both. Nana's idea that the illustration of a child sleeping in the shadow of Sorya (the bear) evoked ideas of protection and safety was particularly resonant, especially as Daniel reminded the group that bears can often be dangerous creatures, but that the illustrator has made a deliberate choice not to depict Sorya in this way. Every child in the meeting represented the school brilliantly, and I am very interested to see what they make of the next two books on the shortlist.





Our new Language of the Month is Bengali!

We are lucky enough to have 17 Bengali speakers at William Patten and to represent the Bengali speakers across the school Helen was joined by Eesa (1H), Luqman (1S), Ellora (3L), Munira and Aminah (4M), and Ishaq (5E). We have chosen Bengali as our new Language of the Month because, as you know, Eid was celebrated on Friday the 21st April by William Patten's Muslim families - We hope you had a wonderful celebration!

Eid isn't just celebrated by Muslim Bengali speakers from Bangladesh; The Muslim children in our school are from many different countries like Pakistan, India, Turkey, Iran and many more and they might speak languages like Arabic, Urdu, Turkish, Farsi and more. Eid celebrations usually include prayers at the mosque, spending time with family and friends, sharing delicious meals together and giving gifts.

During the whole school virtual assembly the classes learnt that Bengali is spoken in Bangladesh and in the Indian states of West Bengal and Tripura. There are about 220 million native speakers and about 250 million speakers of Bengali in total. It is one of the most widely spoken languages, ranking seventh in the world. Bangladesh has a population of around 162 million people and the capital city is Dhaka which has a population of 20 million. The culture of Bangladesh is rich and diverse and has evolved over centuries. Architecture, dance, literature, painting, and clothes are all important parts of the Bangladesh culture. The people of Bangladesh have many festivals and celebrations throughout the year and religion is an integral part of Bangladeshi culture and the major religion in Bangladesh is Islam. There are four main dialects spoken in Bengali, these are: Radha, Kamrupa, Pundra and Bangla. This means that depending on where someone lives in Bangladesh they will speak one of these Bengali dialects. The Bengali script is derived from Brahmi, one of the two ancient Indian scripts. Bengali is written from left to right and there are no capital letters. The script is characterized by many upstrokes, down strokes, and other features that hang from a horizontal line. During the assembly, the classes learnt to say greetings in Bengali and had an opportunity to see how the Bengali script is written.

Save our oceans!

This week in Nursery we have been looking at Oceans. We have been developing our fine motor skills as we made paper plate crabs using paint, pipe cleaners and eye stickers. We have also been using our phonic knowledge to write posters to encourage people to save our oceans from plastic and other rubbish.



Picasso Inspired Bird Sculptures



Children at Y4/5 Art Club were inspired by Pablo Picasso and painted birds in black before making their own fabulous papier mache bird sculptures. Lots of skills were practised and developed - including the safe use of the glue gun!





Landscapes: Polar Regions

Last week, Nursery were looking at Polar Regions as part of our topic "Landscapes." We have been learning about what it looks like and how it would feel like to live in the Arctic and Antarctica as well as finding out information about animals that live there. We then used chalk to draw our favourite animals which included a Musk Ox, Snowy Owl, Arctic wolf, Polar Bears and Arctic Hares.
