Dear parents,

It is half term already and we have certainly packed an awful lot into the last six weeks! Even the youngest children are using sophisticated vocabulary, which is very impressive! For those children who perhaps did not see themselves as writers, they are now willing to have a go and have developed a real stamina for writing. What is most pleasing is that the changes are evident in only six weeks! We still have the rest of the year to go and I look forward to seeing the children continue to grow in confidence and use many different structures in their writing. As you know, we had an OFSTED inspection on 11th and 12th October and we were delighted to receive so many messages of support and offers to help. An inspection happens very quickly, so we may not have been able to respond to all the messages individually, but please know that they were shared with staff and meant a great deal to the team. We also received cake! Imogen and Romy

baked cakes, which made everyone's day and disappeared rather quickly. We loved their messages too!

The inspection report will be published in about five weeks and I will let you know when it is available. Wishing everyone a lovely half term and we look forward to seeing the children back in school on Monday 30th October.

Y5 to the Royal Observatory

On Monday both Year 5 classes went to the Royal Observatory in Greenwich. We got to see a range of telescopes, sundials and clocks during our school trail. All children got to watch a wonderful show in the Planetarium and find out more about space. The children behaved impeccably and a big thank you to our parent helpers!











At Greenwich the bright orange time-ball on the observatory roof drops at 1pm every day. It has done this every day since 1833. Year 5 'timed' it just right and witnessed the drop. The sailors at sea could reset their clocks on board the ships to an accurate time.





Y2 workshop at St Paul's Cathedral

Year 2 participated in a Great Fire of London workshop, at St Paul's Cathedral! The workshop was a great chance for the children to learn more about the Great Fire and just how badly it had affected the city of London. Children joined in for different aspects of the workshop, from retelling how the Great Fire took hold of London in 1666, to looking at artefacts from the Great Fire itself. They also saw three pictures of St Paul's, before the Great Fire, and learnt that the current Cathedral is actually model number 5! The children also gazed in awe at Sir Christopher Wren's design of the dome from the Cathedral floor. Finally, we all climbed up many stairs to the Stone Gallery and took in the views of London's skyline today! It was a great chance to learn first-hand about The Great Fire and its impact on London!



<u>Worry worms</u>

Children in 5S were given hand-knitted worry worms by Sally, their teacher. The woolly worms can be used to share any worries or anxieties, or just to talk to. Some children have made the most beautiful miniature homes for their new mini friends. Such care and creativity is shown in their designs. Language of the Month


To continue our Black History Month celebrations, our new Language of the Month is Shona! On Wednesday 11th October, Helen introduced Shona as the new Language of the Month in a whole school virtual assembly and we were very lucky to have Shona speakers, Hirokaï (Reception C) and his dad. Tawanda, join us. During the assembly the classes learnt that Shona is spoken by over 75% of the 12 million people living in Zimbabwe. Shona is one of the national languages of Zimbabwe. Botswana and Mozambique which are countries in the south of Africa. Zimbabwe is a country in the southern part of Africa that is surrounded by other African countries and its capital city is Harare. Zimbabwe is home to the famous waterfall, Victoria Falls, which is a feature of the river Zambezi and also home to The Great Zimbabwe, the ancient architectural monument of which the country was named after. There are also Shona speaking people in southern Zambia. The Shona language has several dialects including Korekore, Karanga, Ndau, Manyika and Zezuru. This poetic language is derived from the Bantu languages of Central Africa and shares words with Swahili, a language spoken mainly in East and Central Africa. The dialects spoken are a way to understand people's origins or a specific group they might belong to. In Shona, the vowel sounds do not alter from word to word and all words end in a vowel, which makes it one of the easier languages to learn for non-speakers of Shona. The way words are spelt easily indicates how they are meant to sound. Shona is also a tonal language with two tones, high and low, which are not indicated in its written form. During the assembly Tawanda brought in a mbira which is a traditional Zimbabwean musical instrument to show the classes and he also brought in books of African traditional tales which Hirokaï enjoys at home. The most wonderful part of the assembly was when Hirokaï and Tawanda sung a traditional Zimbabwean song which is used to teach children about different family members. The whole school listened beautifully to the song and even clapped and danced along. A huge thank you to Hirokaï and Tawanda!

Y2 exploring sculpture

Year 2 have had a wonderful few weeks learning all about sculptures. They studied some famous sculptors including Henry Moore, Anthony Gormley, Louise Bourgeois and Cornelia Parker. All the children looked at sculptures from other parts of the world which were made of clay and made their own thumb pots and nature inspired art. Everyone was very careful at joining the pieces of clay together using the score and slip method. Have a look at Year 2 hard at work, some excellent concentration faces! The children are really looking forward to our trip to Clissold Park after half term, where we will be making land art inspired by Andy Goldsworthy!











Sumdog Maths Competition

The most recent weeklong Londonwide Sumdog maths competition ran until Thursday this week. At the end of the contest, we received the following message from Sumdog -

'Congratulations to you and all your pupils on your fantastic participation in Greater London Sumdog Maths Contest! Within a week, 3644 pupils answered 648318 questions correctly — which is an impressive amount of maths practice!'

Well done to everyone who took part. Christine's class finished highest on the leaderboard in 33rd position out of all participating classes. Ben's class had the highest proportion of entrants, with 25 children earning points towards their class's combined total. The competition may now be over, but children still have ongoing access to a range of adaptive games and activities proven to increase fluency in maths. As an alternative to Sumdog, the school also promotes use of the White Rose Parent Workbooks for home help. Neurodiversity News

Being able to communicate is one of the most important skills we need in life. Almost everything we do involves communication; everyday tasks such as learning at school, asking for food and drink, sorting out problems, making friends and having fun. These all rely on our ability to communicate with each other. This year we are learning to use a system called Makaton to support communication.

What is Makaton?

Makaton is a unique language programme that uses symbols, signs and speech to enable people to communicate. It supports the development of essential communication skills such as attention and listening, comprehension, memory, recall and organisation of language and expression.

How do we use it?

Each week we introduce 'signs of the week' for the staff team to learn and then use naturally throughout the day, for example: to support instructions, reinforce key vocabulary, support questioning etc. Some children particularly benefit from the use of Makaton but all children and indeed adults benefit from communication through a variety of media: e.g. through visuals, natural gesture, signing etc. Makaton provides us with an additional and valuable communication tool. It's also fun to learn and use.These are some of the signs we have been using this term.
