School Councillors have been busy this term! Here are the latest ideas and updates from most recent meetings.

WET PLAY EQUIPMENT & GAMES

Language of the Month - Punjabi

To celebrate the upcoming Diwali celebration, our new Language of the Month is Punjabi! On Monday the 6th of November, Helen introduced Punjabi as the new Language of the Month in a whole school assembly and we were very lucky to have Gurleen (1H), Khush (3IC), Esha (5S) and Harleen (6B) who are some of our Punjabi speaking pupils at William Patten. This year Diwali is going to be celebrated on Sunday the 12th of November. Diwali is celebrated by different religions: Hindu, Sikh and Jain. People who follow the Hindu, Sikh and Jain religions might speak Punjabi which is our new Language of the Month. For some religions, Diwali also coincides with new year celebrations, is a festival of new beginnings and the triumph of good over evil and light over darkness. When Hindu people celebrate Diwali they light lamps called divas on the night of the new moon to invite the presence of Lakshmi, the goddess of wealth. When Sikh people celebrate Diwali they are celebrating the return of Guru Hargobind to Amritsar. When Jain people celebrate Diwali they are commemorating the enlightenment and liberation of Mahavira, their spiritual guide. When Diwali is celebrated it is an extremely colourful festival with many rangoli patterns being created in homes, many many lights lit in homes and temples, fireworks are also sometimes used to celebrate as it is also known as the Festival of Light. Many families come together to celebrate to share a special meal and visit their temple.

Punjabi is spoken in Pakistan and India. Most of the people who speak Punjabi live in the Punjab region of Pakistan and states in India. It is spoken by the majority of the population of Pakistan. It is also widely spoken in <u>Haryana</u> and <u>Delhi</u>, and other Indian states as well. The Punjabi language is the tenth most widely spoken language in the world. It has around 113 million native speakers. There are very large communities of Puniabi speakers in the United Kingdom and Canada. It is the third-most spoken language in the United Kingdom and the fourth most spoken language in Canada. When it comes to religion and the Punjabi language: There are people who are Muslim who speak punjabi and there are people who are Sikh who speak Punjabi. There are three ways to write Punjabi: Gurmukhī,

Shahmukhī, and Devanāgarī. In the Punjab province of Pakistan, the script that is most used is Shahmukhī. The Majhi dialect is the written standard for Punjabi in both parts of Punjab. Punjabi has many dialects. The dialects are similar enough to each other that speakers can understand most of the dialects that are related to theirs. In India, the main dialects of Punjabi are: Majhi, Doabi, Malwi and Pwadhi. Punjabi is a tonal language and words that otherwise sound similar can have different meanings depending on the tone

used to say the word. The Punjabi language also has a large number of words in it, especially the names of ancient places and the nouns and adjectives used. Why don't you have a go at learning the Punjabi words and phrases alongside the Makaton signs we will be using in class and around the school?



Hackney Foodbank is urging residents to support its annual Reverse Advent Calendar. Instead of counting down to Christmas with a more traditional advent calendar, participants are encouraged to have an advent box and donate an item of long-life food every day for 24 days for people experiencing poverty. They've put together a calendar of most-needed items and are asking residents to also donate non-perishable festive treats. The cost-of-living crisis is having a huge impact locally – demand for Hackney Foodbank increased by 66% between January and October this year (compared with the same period last year) and food donations have dropped.
