


<b>discrimination</b>	Discrimination is prejudice in action; treating people differently.		<b>Other information</b> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>National Windrush Day 2022 saw the unveiling of two public sculptures in Hackney that honour the Windrush Generation.</li> <li>The figures, by London-based artist Thomas J Price, depict representations of the Windrush Generation and their descendants (installed 22 June 2022).</li> </ul>
<b>slavery</b>	Slavery is any system in which principles of property are applied to people, allowing individuals to own, but and sell other individuals. An enslaved person is unable to withdraw from such an agreement and works without payment.		
<b>colony</b>	A country or area controlled politically by a more powerful country that is often far away.		
<b>slave trader</b>	A person who buys and sells slaves.		
<b>plantation</b>	A large farm, especially in a hot part of the world, on which a particular type of crop is grown.	What I've learnt already	Key Knowledge
<b>segregation</b>	The policy of keeping one group of people apart from another and treating them differently, especially because of race, gender, or religion. English slave traders started supplying African slaves to the English colonies.</li> </ul>
<b>Apartheid</b>	Apartheid was a system of institutionalised racial segregation that existed in South Africa and South West Africa (now Namibia) from 1948 until the early 1990s.		The slavery trade triangle involved the transportation by slave traders from Europe of enslaved African people, mainly to the Americas between the 16th – 19th centuries.
<b>Windrush Generation</b>	People arriving in the UK between 1948 and 1971 from Caribbean countries.		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>At the end of the 18th century, public opinion began to turn against the slave trade.</li> <li>In 1772, slavery was ruled illegal in England.</li> </ul>
<b>boycott</b>	To refuse to buy a product or take part in an activity as a way of expressing strong disapproval.		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Boycotts, marches and strikes are all forms of protest; Rosa Parks became one of the major symbols of the Civil Rights movement after she was arrested in Montgomery, Alabama, for refusing to give up her seat to a White passenger in 1955 (which she was required to do under segregation law)</li> </ul>
