


Year 3 took part in a virtual lesson on Prehistoric Britain with the British museum in preparation for their trip this week. The engaging and interesting hour long session included re-capping the timeline from prehistory to present day then focusing on the Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age. 3H and 3B were shown artefacts, video representations of Stone Age settlements and were quizzed on their own historical knowledge to identify artefacts - which they were very good at! The classes took their note taking very seriously and are well prepared for their visit to the British Museum on Wednesday!









This week both **Year 3** classes went on a trip to the British Museum! The visit was a lovely way to round off their History topic - Stone Age to Bronze age and their English writing topics - 'Stone Age Boy' and 'Skara Brae'. The classes were wonderfully behaved on the 73 bus journey and were excellent role models while exploring the museum. Using an activity booklet the classes completed a treasure hunt to locate particular Stone Age, Iron Age and Bronze Age artefacts; drew patterns they saw on stone and metal objects; found and wrote facts about Bronze age jewellery and they even saw the types of objects they had made out of salt dough! After exploring the Pre-Historic Britain rooms they enjoyed their packed lunches in front of the museum in the sunshine - they were very fortunate with the weather! Thank you to both Year 3 classes for their fantastic behaviour and thank you to the parents who volunteered.

The **Eco Committee** met for their first meeting this week. In the meeting we welcomed the newly elected members and thanked previously elected members who have returned for their second year. The children were shown the School's Climate Action Plan and then identified which 5 focusses. from the Eco Schools' framework and linked to the climate plan, they would like to focus their work on this year. The children carried out an audit of the school's current work in each of the focus areas Ten topics - Eco Schools and will meet again after the half term to devise their own Eco School's Action plan. The first task of the Eco Committee will be to run a 'switch off' campaign, in which children understand the benefits of reducing energy use and the environmental implications of generating electricity from fossil-fuels. The Eco Committee had lots of excellent ideas during their meeting and we are really looking forward to using these to carry out activities that raise awareness and promote greater sustainability. The Eco Committee members who have been at Kench Hill this week will also meet after the half term, when they will also be able to contribute their thoughts and ideas to inform future actions.
